College & Career Readiness Workshop Series

Target Audience: Program Length: Occurrences: Max Participation: 6th - 8th grade students 10 months Monthly 30 students per classroom; 150 per student cohort 1 - 2 per classroom

Workshop topics: Exploring careers, understanding GPA, and high school and postsecondary options will help students prepare for the transition to high school and eventually college/university or any other postsecondary pathway. Also, during middle school, students will have to make important decisions about summer programs and high school classes and activities they will want to join.

Over the course of one school year, a series of 50 minute workshops are facilitated per classroom. Different levels of workshops are provided for 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students to be age-appropriate and engaging. All workshops are conducted during the school day in a classroom or designated space within a school. Online tools can be utilized to enhance the individual workshop experience for participating students. An ISBE certified teacher must be present throughout workshop presentations at all times. All workshop materials are provided for participating students throughout the series.

The CCAS College Visit Experience

CCAS coordinates custom college visits for middle school students that incorporate age appropriate activities such as team building, scavenger hunts, mini mock classes and student panels with first-generation college students so they can have an in-depth experience and become more confident about considering college in their own future. Each participating student is provided with a CCAS swag bag that includes a variety of takeaway items. Transportation for students is not provided, though lunch on the college/university campus is included. There is also a requirement of a 1/10 school staff to student ratio for all campus visits.

Middle School Summer Transition Program

The CCAS Middle School Summer Transition Program is an engaging and interactive program designed to help students smoothly transition from elementary school to middle school. This program aims to ease anxieties, build confidence, and equip students with the necessary skills and knowledge to thrive in their new academic environment. Through a combination of fun activities, workshops, and team-building exercises, students will gain a deeper understanding of the expectations, routines, and opportunities that await them in middle school.

In order for this program to operate successfully there will need to be an office/storage space for on-site program staff and materials, 1 classroom per 15 participating students, access to a computer lab and/or laptops for students (school provided), access to the school cafeteria to provide snacks and lunches for students (included), access to the school gymnasium and outdoor space for daily programming, and access to the school auditorium for large student group meetings and events. The program is most successful operating 4 days a week for a total of 4 weeks, though adjustments can be made to the schedule depending on the availability of space. Any school staff that can be involved and provide direct support for this program separately is also highly encouraged.


STEAM Professional Learning Series for Middle School Teachers

Family Services Package - Engaging Families in Postsecondary Conversation

5th - 12th grade students & Families 60 minutes per session 30 participants per session CCAS offers a series of workshops based on the four (4) phases of college access: supporting, preparing, applying, and enrolling.

Each phase offers three workshops to help families

- (a) increase understanding for their child's interest, abilities and talents,
- (b) increase their knowledge about postsecondary options
- (c) increase awareness to help their child prepare for postsecondary pathways



One-on-one or small group sessions are available for each phase of college access for individualized conversation.

Specialized Visits to any of Northeastern Illinois University's campuses-Main Campus (North), Carruther's Center for Inner City Studies (CCICS, Bronzeville) and/or El Centro Campus (Avondale) can be coordinated.

K-5th Grade

Families will learn about personality traits and their importance in identifying abilities within their children. We'll discuss how personality traits can influence high school, postsecondary, and career selection. We'll share opportunities families can explore within their communities that encourage their children's development and interests.

Middle School

Exploring careers, navigating high school fairs/open houses, understanding GPA, and high school options will help families prepare for the transition to high school. Families will gain insight about the different types of high schools, their selectivity, and Career & Technical Education (CTE) programs that are available.

High School

The importance of understanding college options including trade and certificate programs, selectivity, type, and financial considerations is important in supporting the college application process. Beginning with 9th grade, these presentations build upon the children's interests as they convert their interests, abilities, and talents to possible postsecondary pathways.

K-5th Grade

Learning can be fun and found in everyday life. Understanding personality and learning style will help establish study habits, healthy routines, and tools to help prepare children for a lifetime of learning and will be the focus of these workshops.

Middle School

During middle school, families will have to make important decisions about summer programs and high school. These sessions will discuss CTE options, summer programs, and ways to keep children engaged in learning throughout the year.

High School

Selecting a postsecondary option begins with building up your children's extracurriculars. School clubs, volunteerism, and taking early college classes (dual enrollment and dual credit) can make a big difference in the types of financial awards children receive. Families will explore the different opportunities available to students and their importance in the application process.

K-5th Grade

Understanding how children learn, make friends, and in which environments they thrive are indicators of where they'll be academically, socially, and emotionally successful. Families will identify characteristics of their children's learning styles to guide them into successful environments.

Middle School

As families look forward towards 8th grade graduation, this is also a critical time for deciding which high school children will attend. Workshops will provide tools for researching, considering, applying, and determining a good match and fit high school for their children.

High School

What's a good match and fit college/university for my children? The focus of these workshops is understanding postsecondary options, understanding the cost of attendance, scholarships, and the application processes in order to select the right postsecondary for your children. Families will also discuss campus visits and their importance in determining the "right fit".
